Emotions in History, Lost and Found, with a Postscript on Empathy

In this public lecture on "Emotions in History: Lost and Found", Professor Ute Frevert will explain the central arguments of her recent book of the same title about

the historicity of the emotions. The lecture will explain the idea of a political economy of emotions that has changed in its structure and functions over time, looking in particular detail at the historical trajectories of empathy and compassion as modern moral emotions. The lecture will analyse the ways that the limits of empathy were negotiated and renegotiated during the nineteenth century.
